



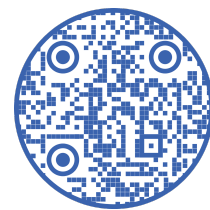

East Oakland Rising: Win the Fight, Protect the Win is a 2021 short documentary, directed by Cheo Tyehimba. It highlights the stories of everyday people coming together to build relationships and trust, knowledge and understanding, and collective determination to fight environmental racism, unfair housing policies, and gentrification in East Oakland, CA. It showcases a ten-year community-organizing journey and offers a valuable blueprint for how to build power and policy wins for the next generation.

Written by housing scholar Gregg Colburn and data journalist Clayton Aldern, this book explores the question: what drives the prevalence of homelessness in a given city? Given that common narratives don't explain why, the authors argue that housing market conditions, such as the cost and availability of rental housing, offer a more convincing explanation.
